Simple Sentence: A sentence with a subject (a person or thing) and a verb (an action) which makes sense on its own.

It must start with a capital le er and end with a full stop.

Examples: I ran to the park. I am hungry.

Compound sentence: a sentence with two **main clauses** (simple sentences) joined together by a **conjunc on** (and, but, so).

Examples: I ran to the park and I played football. I am hungry but I just had dinner.

Some mes there is no right or wrong answer to a topic, only dierent opinions. When giving an opinion you can agree to dierent extents.

Completely, totally, wholly, unreservedly, u erly: You agree or disagree without any doubt or room for ques oning.

Example: I completely disagree with violence; it is always unnecessary.

Par ally, somewhat, moderately, I agree/disagree to a certain extent, I agree/disagree to a certain degree: You agree/disagree with some of the statement/topic, but not all of it.

Example: I par ally agree with the decision to set homework but I can also see the problems it causes.

You can use the acronym **MADFOREST** to help you remember persuasive techniques.

Metaphor: A comparison that is not literal, it states that something is something it cannot be. Does not use like or as.

Allitera on: Beginning more than one word with the same sound.

Direct address:

- 1. Create a set of **flashcards** with key words on one side and deli ni ons or pictures on the other.
